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An Analysis Of Narrative Themes In British Children's Fantasy Literature In The Victorian Period

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Abstract: With the vigorous industrial revolution, English literature has developed by leaps and bounds, promoting the germination of the awareness of "writing for children", coupled with the increase in social education and family education investment, the development of British children's fantasy literature has a solid economic and ideological foundation. The Victorian period was the first peak period of British children's literature. During this period, the number of children's literature works was not only large, but also highly accomplished, which had a profound impact on the development of children's literature in later generations. "Behind the North Wind" by the famous British children's writer MacDonald presents the happiness and beauty of "death", rather than casting a terrifying haze over death. The story's protagonist, Little Diamond, lives in a parallel world, living in reality during the day and living a bleak and tragic life. The night lives in a dream, and travels through a mysterious and peaceful country. Little Diamond made a friend named Beifeng. Driven by curiosity, he began to explore the secret behind Beifeng, and finally passed through Beifeng's body and came to the back of Beifeng, to an unimaginable place. (Indicating that the little diamond is going to die). When describing the death situation of little diamond, the author did not use too "pen and ink" to describe the death of little diamond in reality, but used a lot of plot to define the dream world, to explain that the end of human beings after death is heaven, the destination of love and beauty. In the Victorian period, many writers thought deeply about life, and most of them believed that death was the only way to break through the constraints of natural society and pursue spiritual freedom. In reality, if you cannot dream of beauty and happiness, then death will surely bloom beauty and find the true meaning of happiness [2].

3. The theme of growth

Growth is a constant theme. The process of growing up is full of bitterness and pain, and contains countless trials and tribulations. Only by stepping over the thorns on the road of growth can we reap the fruits of growth. There were many growth-themed narratives in British children's fantasy literature in the Victorian period, and many works explained the meaning and value of growth. For example, in Wilde's "Star Child", Star Child is a child with a golden key and reasonable expectations. But he is selfish, ruthless, and has no empathy, and gradually grows into a shameless "villain". The turning point of the story is that he drives away his mother, loses his beautiful face a little bit, and loses the good life he has. Then step by step toward the road of repentance, he finally experienced all kinds of difficulties and dangers, overcame many difficulties, and completed self-redemption, thus regaining his true nature, regaining everything in the past, and becoming a generation of kings. This story shows that people must endure trials and tribulations before growing up. No matter how vicious they are, they can achieve self-redemption and become a winner in life as long as they get lost. In MacDonald's "The Princess and the Devil", Adi, a young absentee from work, defied danger and escorted Princess Irene and the protection back to the castle in the mountains. On the way, he experienced many dangerous trials, grew into a man who is indomitable, and finally fulfilled his mission. This story shows that people are always in pursuit of growth, and they must make the right choices and find their own direction. Only by experiencing the trials of growth can you achieve success in life and finally live the happy life you want. In much Victorian English children's fantasy literature, children's most tremendous success is not how much they have achieved in life, but getting home safely. Home, as a place for children, is full of love and warmth, and is a paradise for children to grow up. Children's fantasy literature ends at home, which not only meets children's psychological and emotional needs, but also meets children's real-life needs [3].

4. Conclusion

To sum up, the British children's fantasy literature in the Victorian period occupies an essential position in the whole world of children's literature. It is a product based on the changes of the British era and social development at that time, and is full of changes in ideology and values brought about by cultural changes.
